The Renaissance of International Passenger Night Train Traffic on Rail

Until a few years ago, international (and national) rail passenger night traffic was on decline. It was regarded as uneconomic which in many cases triggered a negative spiral. No investment in new rolling stock has been done which made the remaining services more and more unattractive. Connections were sometimes better some decades ago compared to today. Recently, however, this has changed. The climate change has put focus on to reduce emissions from flight traffic. Today there is a desire to replace parts of European air travel with fast trains, and on longer distances night train traffic. Politicians, authorities, operators and the public talk more and more about reviving abandoned services, upgrading existing ones and opening new ones to again and attract more passengers.

The seminar starts from the Swedish perspective with an operator's view and thoughts about possible public procurement of night train services from and to Sweden. We will then get a presentation on the possible market and economy for such traffic. We will also hear about research results regarding changes of travelling habits.

After the break we will give an international outlook on strategies regarding night train services both from the Austrian railways and finally a presentation about a German study of the possibilities for future European passenger traffic.
